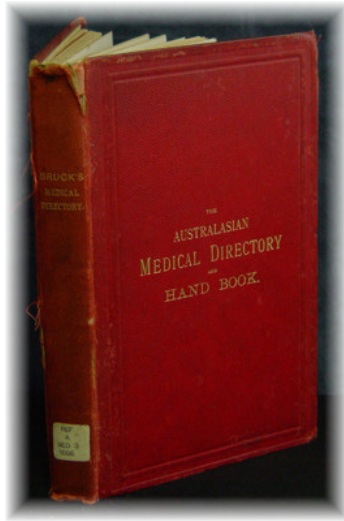

REGULATIONS AFFECTING MEDICAL ATTENDANCE

AT LOCKUPS AND ELSEWHERE AT THE REQUEST OF THE POLICE.

NEW SOUTH WALES.

Ordinary Visits.

Legally qualified Medical Men will be allowed a fee of ten shillings for each visit in ordinary cases, to include all necessary medicines, dressing, &c.

Minor Operations.

For minor operations, a fee of one guinea.

Capital Operations.

For capital operations the account will be paid after reference to the Medical Adviser to the Government, if considered reasonable.

Fees at Night.

Double fees on ordinary visits will be allowed at night—i.e., between 10 p.m. and 5 a.m.

Fees for Examination and Evidence, &c.

The fee for examination and evidence in Lunacy and other cases will be one guinea, and where two or more cases are heard on the same day half fees only will be allowed after the first. The charge for attending and examining the prisoner in the lockup will be included in the fee of one guinea.

Mileage.

Mileage from the medical man's residence to the place where the patient is seen will be allowed at the rate of five shillings per mile beyond the first up to five miles, and seven shillings per mile for each mile above five up to twenty-five. Four miles by rail to be equal to one by road. Cases occurring above twenty-five miles to be submitted for the determination of the Medical Adviser to the Government.

Accounts.

The accounts to be rendered to the Police quarterly, and to specify the dates of the service, the names of the patients, and the nature of the complaints, with a special explanation justifying more than one visit to a patient in any one day.

In cases where more than one patient is medically attended during a visit to a lockup or other place, only half fee for each visit after the first is to be charged, and no mileage. This is not to refer to operations.

CLEVELAND, 20 miles E. of Brisbane, a favourite watering-place on the shores of Moreton Bay. The total rainfall in 1884 was 48 inches, with 79 wet days. Oranges and bananas are extensively grown. Sea-baths.

DALBY—1,123 feet above sea-level, 152 miles (by rail) W. of Brisbane, and 112 miles from the coast, in the pastoral district of Northern Downs. The climate is dry and bracing. The annual rainfall is about 18 inches, with 62 wet days.

HERBERTON—Over 2,000 feet above sea-level, 900 miles N.W. of Brisbane, and 50 miles from the coast, situated on the Wild River, is destined to become a health resort. The scenery is very fine, and the climate dry, cool and very salubrious. About 25 miles from Herberton are the Innot thermal springs, with a very good bush hotel for invalids.

HEWITTVILLE, OR EMU PARK, 28 miles N.E. from Rockhampton, and 20 miles N. of the entrance to the Fitzroy River, a fashionable watering place on the Pacific coast, prettily situated on a plateau, over 50 feet above sea-level, enclosed on the land side, in horseshoe form, by a chain of bald hills rising to a height of 500 feet. The view towards the east of the sea and the numerous islands is very beautiful. The temperature, though generally refreshingly cool, is liable to sudden changes, especially at night. Sea-bathing at all times.

IPSWICH, 65 feet above sea-level, 23 miles (by rail) S.W. from Brisbane, and 28 miles from the coast, pleasantly situated on the Bremer River. Climate very salubrious. The annual rainfall is about 33 inches, with 104 wet days.

MOUNT PERRY—2,500 feet above sea-level, 200 miles N.W. of Brisbane, and 60 miles from the coast, situated at the foot of Mt. Perry. The surrounding country is mountainous and the scenery extremely beautiful. The climate is fairly dry and very salubrious. English fruits are grown here. There are a number of highly mineralised springs in the district, containing iron, magnesia, and soda, and having a temperature of from 65° F. to 75° F. *Special Indications*: Chest diseases, especially asthma, bronchitis, pleurisy; also for convalescents.

PIALBA—22 miles N. of Maryborough, a favourite watering-place, prettily situated on the shore of Hervey Bay. Bracing climate. Abundance of oysters. *Special Indications*: General debility, incipient phthisis, chronic bronchial catarrh.

ROMA—978 feet above sea-level, 317 miles (by rail) N.W. from Brisbane, and 260 miles from the coast, the principal town in the Western District. Vine and oranges are extensively grown; fine climate. The average annual amount of rainfall is 38 inches. *Special Indications*: Phthisis.

SANDGATE—13 miles (by rail) N. from Brisbane, a much-frequented watering-place, pleasantly situated on the shores of Moreton Bay. Sea-baths.

SOUTHPORT—46 miles S.E. of Brisbane, a favourite watering-place on the coast, at the mouth of the Nerang River, surrounded by magnificent scenery. The total rainfall in 1884 was 82 inches, with 79 wet days. Sea-baths; hot salt-water baths; fine jetty, 800 feet long. *Special Indications*: All chest diseases. *Season*: Throughout the year.

STANTHORPE—2,656 feet above sea-level, 207 miles (by rail) S.W. from Brisbane, and 90 miles from the coast, near the southern border. The climate is dry and very invigorating. The days are warm, but the evenings are always cool. The total rainfall in 1884 was 18 inches, with 62 wet days. The surrounding country is mountainous, and the scenery is grand and beautiful. *Special Indications*: Phthisis, and all diseases requiring a bracing climate.

TOOWOOMBA—1,921 feet above sea-level, 100 miles (by rail) W. from Brisbane, and 80 miles from the coast, the most important town on the western slope of the main range on the Darling Downs, the so-called "Garden of Queensland." The climate is very fine, cool, and bracing; cool nights in summer; the winter is rather cold. The mean maximum temperature in summer is about 82° F. The total rainfall is about 29 inches, with 95 wet days. Vines and oranges are extensively grown. *Special Indications*: General debility, convalescence from fever and ague. *Season*: From October to April.

YEPPOON—40 miles N.E. from Rockhampton, a rising watering-place on the Pacific coast, surrounded by wooded hills. The scenery is very pretty. There are lovely fern-tree gullies, dells, forests, &c.; also, splendid views of the sea, dotted with numerous islands and rocks. The temperature is very equable. The heat of the summer is tempered by fresh and invigorating breezes from the sea, and the climate in autumn and spring is delightful. Fine sheltered beaches; sea-bathing. *Special Indications*: General debility, convalescence.

Getting around this CD

Navigating Archive CD Books CDs

All Archive CD Books products can be navigated easily using the handy bookmarks on each CD. The table of contents in most original books, and the original book index where it exists, can provide additional ways of finding the information required.

Searching Text on Archive CD Books Australia CDs

Optical Character Recognition (OCR) technology has been developing over the years as a useful mechanism to convert images (as Archive CD Books pages are) into text which can be searched. The quality of the OCR can still vary, and hence the searchability can vary. Around 95% or 99% of the words in books with good type are searchable—or even higher with very good type.

*OCR is now a wonderful searching aid in many instances
but there is still no substitute for reading the book!*

Different Versions of Adobe Acrobat Reader

Adobe Acrobat Reader 4 or later should be used. Adobe Reader 6 (as it is now named) in fact has considerably better searching options and is recommended.

- **Acrobat Reader v4** has both a “Find” and a “Search” tool. Those tools are two **totally** different things. Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool
- **Acrobat Reader v5** has only a “Find” tool (not a “search” tool). Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **FIND** tool.
- **Adobe Reader v6** has only a “Search” tool (not a tool labelled “Find”). HOWEVER — what is called “Search” is the same as the tool that used to be called “Find” Our CDs (that are searchable) work with the **SEARCH** tool

Tips For Searching and Getting More From the CD Books

- update to Adobe Reader 6 for more versatile searching options, including the ability to bring up a list of all instances of the word you are searching for — across multiple files on a single CD in a single search request.
- enter the **MINIMUM** number of characters needed to bring up the search results required.
- use Adobe Reader 6 to do some trial searches to try to identify the characters that may be misread. These can show up in the extra text in the search results list (Adobe 6 only). A few minutes trial will help you to avoid using characters that are more prone to being misread, e.g. try entering “rederi” if you want “Frederick”, but find that the letters “F” “c” and “k” are sometimes misread.
- use the “Match whole word” option to eliminate unnecessary items in your results list, e.g. to eliminate all the blacksmiths and tinsmiths etc when you only want the name Smith.
- use the “Match case” option to eliminate all the occupations “smith” if you only want the name “Smith”.
- don’t just search for names. Search the book for other names, places and subjects of interest:
 - › look for others of the same name
 - › look for others who lived in the same place or street
 - › who was the postmaster or police officer in the town?
 - › how often and at what time did the coach arrive in town?
 - › what churches were there and what time were services held?
 - › what other activities were there in the community?
 - › look for others who had the same occupation or other interests
- all of this and more may be available in a seemingly mundane book such as a directory. You can learn much of the background of life at the time, even if your ancestor is not listed there.
- Many CDs have only one file, but some have the book content spread over several files. Adobe Reader normally searches in the file that is open at the time. If you wish to search ALL files at once choose the “All PDF documents in” option and select the CD drive or directory the files are in—Adobe Reader 6 only.

ADOBE ACROBAT SEARCHING IS A WONDERFUL FIRST FINDING AID.
BUT DO NOT RELY ON IT TO PICK UP ALL THE INFORMATION YOU WANT
